

# <u> Beautiful Eucharist – Father Eric Boelscher</u>

Let's continue to look at the book Beautiful Eucharist. The 9<sup>th</sup> chapter is: The Ultimate Proof of God's Love, by Father Eric Boelscher.

Father Eric Boelscher is a priest in the Diocese of Covington, Kentucky, pastor to Saint Joseph parish and school community in Crescent Springs, Kentucky, and beloved chaplain at Dynamic Catholic.

Fr. Boelscher begins his reflection with, "How do we know that God loves us? I 'm sure you've been told many times by many good-intentioned people that 'God loves you.' But in a world full of broken people, messy relationships and an unfortunate amount of cruelty, it can feel like a trite or empty phrase." Fr. Boelscher is reminded of St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians where he says "For Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, Jews and Greeks alike, Christ the power of God and wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength."

St. Paul explains that if you are looking for proof that God's love is real. God has already given it. He gives it on the Cross. Sacrifice is the language of love. Fr. Boelscher writes, "So, can any of us be sure that God loves us? Perhaps this sounds foolish to some, and maybe too simple to others, but that proof can be found on every altar at every parish by every Catholics with the eyes to see it. Right in the middle of the worship, in the small white host raised to Heaven, there is a re-presentation of the one eternal sacrifice of Christ on His Cross. That is the very essence of the Eucharist. It is Christ himself, given up for you and me on the Cross, offered to us now and for eternity." The Cross is an immovable sign of His love. It is hard to imagine what more He could do to prove his love.

Then, let us pray, "Jesus, begin a revolution of love in my heart today. Teach me to love myself as you love me, so that I can love others who cross my path in a way that reminds them that you are the revolutionary the world needs in all places and at all times. Amen."

# The Liturgy of the Eucharist

## The Communion Rite

In Fr. Paul Turner's book Let Us Pray: A Guide to the Rubrics of Sunday Mass, he explains that we "have prepared [our]selves through The Introductory Rites and the Liturgy of the Word. The bread and wine have been readied. The priest has led the people in the Eucharistic Prayer, in which the Holy Spirit has transformed the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. Now everyone shares the sacrament of salvation." The Communion Rite is "meant to lead the people to the sacred point of Holy Communion and help ensure they are properly disposed to receive the Body and Blood of Christ." (Sri) It is the link between the Eucharistic prayer and the reception of the Eucharist.

There are five parts to the Communion Rite:

- The Lord's Prayer
- Rite of Peace
- Breaking of the Bread (or Fraction Rite)
- Communion
- Prayer After Communion

The Lord's Prayer includes four elements which we experience as a single section.

<u>The Invitation to Prayer</u>: After the Great Amen, the priest calls us to prayer: "*At the Savior's command and formed by divine teaching, we dare to say.*" What is so "daring" about it? We are calling God "our Father." Although the Jewish people considered God to be the Father of the people of Israel, they would never address him as "Father" (or "Abba") because that is an affectionate term. But Jesus calls us to do so, so we do as He asks.

<u>Prayer</u>: This is the prayer Jesus taught his disciples. You can find it in 2 of the Gospels (Matthew and Luke.) Matthew's account is more robust and was thus adapted to the familiar prayer we use. St. Thomas Aquinas calls the Lord's Prayer the "most perfect of prayers...[It] not only teaches us to ask for things, but also in what order we should desire them." (CCC 2763) It is "truly the summary of the whole Gospel." (CCC 2761)

The Lord's Prayer begins by placing us in God's presence (*Our Father, who art in heaven...*) and is followed by 7 petitions. The first 3 draw us towards His glory ("*Thy name, Thy kingdom, Thy will*") to strengthen us in faith, hope and charity. The last 4 focus on our wants ("give us...forgive us...lead us not...deliver us.")

Fr. Driscoll states it is "recited at this moment" of the Mass as "the foundation of any other praying of this prayer throughout our Christian lives. Here its original and fullest meaning is revealed and defined." (Driscoll) "The petitions are based on the mystery of salvation already accomplished, petitions that will be fully heard at the coming of the Lord." (Compendium of the CCC 581)

<u>Embolism</u>: This builds on the last line of the prayer ("but deliver us from evil") and "Asks for deliverance from the power of evil for the whole community of the faithful." (GIRM 81) It brings the prayer around to God's final establishment of peace in the world.

<u>Doxology</u>: *"For the kingdom, the power..."* This is not part of the prayer that Jesus taught us; however, it is scripturally based and has been used since the early days of the Church. It is derived from King David's words in one of his last acts as king, humbly recognizing that all the good of his kingship came from God. (1 Chronicles 29:10-11)
