

My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As Catholics we are called to continually learn and grow in our knowledge of the faith and the Church. This growth allows us to deepen our relation ship with God and allows us to become a "new creation" that gives hope to others. As Pope Benedict XVI so wonderfully stated, "The aim of all Christian education, moreover, is to train the believer in an adult faith that can make him a "new creation", capable of bearing witness in his surroundings to the Christian hope that inspires him."

Over the next several weeks I will be including in the bulletin, articles written by the Coordinator of the Office for Divine Worship in our diocese about the structure and aspects of the Mass. My hope is that this will help all of us not just have a better understanding of the beauty and history of the Mass but also to enter into the Mass more fully.

In the last article, we talked about the Introductory Rites. This week, we move to:

The Liturgy of the Word

Often, we think of the Liturgy of the Word as merely the readings, but it encompasses so much more. Drawing from my theatrical background, I liken the Liturgy of the Word to the 'first act' of a play or musical, despite some clergy's reservations. What happens during the first act? It sets the stage for the exciting and glorious events of the second act. It introduces the characters and their backgrounds, helping us understand their journeys and motivations. Similarly, the Liturgy of the Word provides us with the rich history and Tradition of our faith, preparing us to fully appreciate the revelations in the Liturgy of the Eucharist. To truly grasp the depth of what is revealed, we must pay close attention and understand our heritage.

Because there are 8 parts to the Liturgy of the Word, we will divide it between this and the next two week's articles. The primary parts are the readings from scripture and the Responsorial Psalm.

The First Reading – This is usually taken from the Old Testament or the Acts of the Apostles (during the Easter season). The Old Testament readings relate to the Gospel. They show how the Old Testament's teachings come to be fulfilled by Christ. "The Old Testament's collection of over a thousand years of theological traditions is centered around Exodus and God's covenant with Israel. Everything leads to, recounts, or looks back on the wandering in the desert and entering the Promised Land. Each subsequent

generation remembers and celebrates God's involvement in human history." (Buzaitis, 2018)

The Responsorial Psalm – While the Lector or Cantor proclaims the Word, the faithful respond to the Word. "The use of psalms in liturgy continues the practice of the Jewish Synagogue, where a psalm or biblical canticle was sung after the first reading. In the current Mass, the choice of the psalm usually echoes a textual or spiritual theme in the First Reading. It is taken from the Book of Psalms or, rarely, a canticle from Exodus, Daniel, or Revelation." (Buzaitis, 2018)

The Second Reading – "Outside of the Easter season, the Second Reading is taken from the Letters of St. Paul or St. James or the Letter to the Hebrews. During the Easter season, we hear from the First Letter of St. Peter (Year A), First Letter of St. John (Year B), or the Book of Revelation (Year C). The choice of the text was made quite independently of the first reading or Gospel, but during certain seasons, passages correspond with the mystery being celebrated at that particular time." (Buzaitis, 2018) "These letters (epistles) or readings from the Acts of the Apostles, reflect on the mystery of Jesus Christ, his saving work, and its practical application and meaning for our lives. Through these Apostles' writings, 'we encounter the risen Lord through their witness.'" (Driscoll)

According to the Lectionary for Mass (LFM,) "When in celebrating the Liturgy, the Church proclaims both the Old and New Testament. It is proclaiming one and the same mystery of Christ. The New Testament lies hidden in the Old; the Old Testament comes fully to light in the New. Christ himself is the center and fullness of the whole of Scripture, just as he is of all liturgical celebration...The more profound our understanding of the celebration of the liturgy, the higher our appreciation of the importance of God's word."

The lector, cantor, and homilist all proclaim God's Word from the ambo, which the General Instruction of the Lectionary refers to as the 'Altar of the Word'—distinct from the Altar of the Eucharist. Shouldn't we revere it just as much? Consider the call and response at the end of the readings: "The Word of the Lord/Thanks be to God." Similarly, in the Liturgy of the Eucharist, we respond with "The Body of Christ/Amen." In both instances, we are receiving what we need to understand, accept, and truly know God's love for us.
