Beautiful Eucharist - Allen Hunt

Lets continue to look at the book Beautiful Eucharist. The 10th chapter is: 30 Words that Revolutionized My Life, by Allen Hunt.

Allen Hunt is the author of a number of bestselling books, including No Regrets and Confessions of a Mega Church Pastor. While serving as an evangelical mega church pastor, Allen began a remarkable journey culminating in his conversion to Catholicism. He now helps lead Dynamic Catholic in the mission to help rediscover the genius and relevance of Catholicism.

The reflection by Allen Hunt begins with the words that revolutionized his life, The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it an said, "This is my body, which is for you." When Allen Hunt a Methodist pastor was attending graduate school, he met a Catholic priest Father Steven. They became lifelong friends.

Father Steven invited Allen to give a retreat to a group of cloistered Dominican nuns. When Allen met the 50 nuns they all seemed to have a radiance that took him by surprise. Allen gave a talk on six straight Wednesdays along with Father Steven. On the last day of the retreat, a nun named Sister Rose ask him a question: "Allen, you're the first Methodist pastor that most of us have ever met. And I also want to tell you, after listening to you for these past six weeks, you sound really Catholic. So I have to ask you, why aren't you a part of the Church?" Allen though this was a strange question. He was pastor of a "Church," a United Methodist Church. Sister Rose asked the same question again 2 more times. Allen answered why he was not Catholic, "I don't understand what you believe about Communion. For me it's just obvious that the bread and the wine are symbols. They're special. They're important. They're holy. But to somehow believe that they're miraculously transformed into the body and blood of Jesus, literally, that just doesn't make sense to me." Sister Rose directed Allen to 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 where Jesus says, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me."

Sister Rose had planted the first seed on Allen's long and difficult journey from pastor of a mega church to home in the Catholic Church. Allen writes, "I love so many things about being Catholic, but what I love most is the privilege and joy of receiving Jesus in the Eucharist." He concludes with, "Let us never take for granted the extraordinary treasure of the Eucharist. Let us never become numb to the fact that Jesus wants to give Himself fully to you and me at every Mass. He really is there, waiting to transform our lives. This is the greatest treasure we could ever hope to have."

The Liturgy of the Eucharist

The Communion Rite, continued...

As I previously stated, there are five parts to the Communion Rite: The Lord's Prayer, Rite of Peace, Breaking of the Bread (or Fraction Rite), Communion, and The Prayer After Communion. Now, we move on to:

Rite of Peace

"In the Rite of Peace, the Church prays for peace, and the faithful express it to one another." (GIRM 82) The priest alone offers a prayer to Christ for the peace and unity of the Church, by recalling Jesus' promise to his apostles at the Last Supper, "Lord Jesus Christ who said to your apostles peace I leave you, my peace I give you..." (GIRM 154) The priest then asks Jesus to grant us this peace and unity: peace for the Church itself and for the entire human family. The priest then extends Christ's peace to us, as the resurrected Jesus did to greet His apostles, "Peace be with you." (John 20:20) We respond, offering the peace of Christ to the priest.

The Breaking of the Bread

After the Rite of Peace, our focus returns to the altar. "The Gospels recount four instances when Jesus broke bread: two feedings of large crowds, at the Last Supper, and at Emmaus, where the two apostles recognized the resurrected Jesus in the breaking of the bread. The breaking of the bread (or fraction) has both practical and symbolic significance. A larger host is divided into pieces to be consumed, and the smaller hosts are separated into additional vessels for multiple communion stations. Symbolically, this shows the importance of the sign of the unity of all in the one bread, and of the sign of charity by the fact that the one bread is distributed among the brothers and sisters." (GIRM 321) (Buzaitis)

During the Breaking of the Bread, the priest places a tiny portion of the consecrated host into the chalice. This commingling "signif[ies] the unity of the Body and Blood of the Lord in the work of salvation, namely, of the Body of Jesus Christ, living and glorious." (GIRM 83) The priest quietly prays that "the mingling of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it." (Order of Mass 129) During this significant action of the Breaking of the Bread, we sing (or recite) the threefold Lamb of God litany. This title for Jesus (Lamb of God) shows the unity of His sacrifice at the Last Supper and His sacrifice on the cross. John the Baptist recognized Jesus as the Son of God, saying, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) Our asking Him to "have mercy on us" and "grant us peace" continues our preparation to receive the Eucharist.

Within the five parts of the Communion Rite (The Lord's Prayer, Rite of Peace, Breaking of the Bread (or Fraction Rite), Communion, and The Prayer After Communion) there is Communion, which may seem odd. Why wouldn't the Communion Rite simply be Communion? The Catholic definition of "Communion Rite" is 'the celebration of the Eucharist as a paschal meal. It implies that the faithful in good dispositions should answer to the Lord's command by receiving his body and blood as their spiritual nourishment. They are prepared for the Communion and thank him afterward in a series of liturgical rites, beginning with the Lord's Prayer and ending with the Prayer After Communion.' Isn't this what usually happens when we are invited into someone's home for a meal? Dinnertime is most often 'family time.' They have invited us to share this special event. Beforehand, we enjoy time together to re-connect and sometimes help set the table and prepare for the meal, making sure we are all ready to break bread together. The meal is the culmination, but it is also the central point of what brings us together.
