

Beautiful Eucharist - Jenna Greiwe

To continue to share the main message of the National Eucharistic Congress, lets continue to look at the book Beautiful Eucharist. The 5th chapter is: "Come Away to a Quite Place" by Jenna Greiwe.

As a freshman in high school, Jenna's faith would begin to come to life through the example of Angie, her youth minister. Jenna writes, "My faith was shallow. Almost everything else in my life was a priority over my relationship with Jesus. What could Angie see that I couldn't? What was she aware of that I was missing?" It was spending time monthly in Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. At these youth group Adorations Jenna learned to hear Jesus' call to "Come away to a quiet place" to connect with Jesus. The more time Jenna spent in His presence the more impact it had on receiving the Eucharist on Sunday.

Jenna writes, "when my life gets taken over by confusion, anxiety and overwhelm, I can trace it back to one thing: I haven't been seeking out Jesus in the quiet of Adoration." She continues, "Whenever you are filled with worry, desperate for hope, looking for clarity, or just need a moment of peace, go to a quiet place and visit Jesus in The Eucharist. Just talk to him like He's sitting on the altar. He'll give you exactly what you need."

Therefore, let us pray! "Lord, whenever I am filled with worry, desperate for hope, looking clarity, or just need a moment of peace, remind me to visit you in the Eucharist. Draw me to that quiet place where I just know you will give me exactly what I need. Amen."

Continuation of the Liturgy of the Word:

The Gospel Acclamation – The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) says that the Gospel Acclamation is to "gather the faithful [to] welcome and greet the Lord who is about to speak to them in the Gospel and profess their faith by means of the chant." (GIRM 62) The sung Acclamation takes place during the procession of the Book of the Gospel to the Ambo. As Buzaitis says, this singing isn't just traveling music. That's a theatre reference also; music used so the patrons aren't bored when no dialogue is said where the characters are moving to the next scene. The Acclamation "constitutes a rite or act in itself." (GIRM 62) "Alleluia" is the Greek form of the Hebrew word "Hallelu Yah," which means "Praise the Lord!" or more literally "Praise Yahweh!" (Buzaitis, 2018) And that is all we are doing during the Gospel Acclamation. Not thanking him for anything...just praising Him for who He is. Praising God: the purest form of prayer.

We often have a verse during the Gospel Acclamation that is found in the Lectionary. It is a quote from the Gospel we are about to hear, one of the other readings or sometimes based on another scripture.

We omit the Alleluia during Lent to "cultivate a longing to celebrate the Passover of Jesus Christ, his Paschal Mystery: his Easter." (The Mass, Wuerl)

The Gospel – "The reading of the Gospel constitutes the high point of the Liturgy of the Word." (GIRM 60) The Gospels are the "heart of all the Scriptures." (CCC 125) Because of this we stand, there is an acclamation, and we trace the Sign of the Cross three times. Often, there will also be incensing. A three-year cycle gives us almost continuous readings from key parts of the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke in Ordinary Time. These are called the 'Synoptic Gospels' because they tell of similar events. We hear from John scattered throughout each year. (We'll look at Gospels more after the Parts of the Mass series.)

The Homily – The Homilist (usually the presider or deacon) is a very important role. In I Corinthians 14:20-33, Saint Paul tells us that hearing God's word is not enough. It also needs to be understood. The homily is a "means of bringing the scriptural message to life in a way that helps the faithful to realize that God's word is present and at work in their everyday lives." (Pope Benedict XVI) Cardinal Wuerl has said that "the effect of the homily is not so much the work of the preacher as it is a work of the Spirit." Some feel that the homily should only focus on the readings. However, because the Holy Spirit is working through the homilist, something else may be needed by the assembly. Sometimes a certain prayer, feast, or a Liturgical Season are believed to be more in order for the homily.

I have (jokingly) said in the past that if The Liturgy of the Word is Act I, then 'obviously' the homily is intermission. What does a good theatregoer do during the intermission? They think about and try make sense of the first act. They need to understand it to truly appreciate the second act. That is what is happening during the Homily.
